




Christmas Appeal for Bulgaria

FROM THE MINISTER

Rev Heather Cadoux

Dear Friends,

I'm wondering where this year has gone! With the First Sunday in Advent we begin the church's year, as we prepare and wait in Advent for Christmas to arrive and rejoice as we remember the birth of Jesus - a promise of new life for each of us. Though as I write this, we are on tenterhooks wating for



the new Chancellor's autumn statement. The press build-up seems to be full of doom and gloom. Prices are increasing and things I used to pop in my shopping bag each week are staying on the shelves as I begrudge paying the increase for something that, if I'm honest, I can easily do without. The state of the economy and the energy price increases that have happened or are in the pipeline make that gloom grow darker.

From what I hear and read, people are reluctant to put on their heating because of the cost. I suspect that like me most of you grew up in homes without central heating, and at certain times of the year drew back the curtains of a morning to discover that Jack Frost had visited and left wonderful icy patterns on the inside of the windows. Back then vests were worn along with cardigans and jumpers that grew in thickness and number as the weather became colder. Although for much of the week it was only the living room that was heated, and I needed to pop a hot water bottle in my bed before I went to sleep, I don't remember being cold, there was comforting food that gave us the calories we needed to keep warm.

So what can we do as Christians to make a difference? One thing is to pray. **Pray** for those in authority having to make tough decisions and that those decisions will be for the benefit of those who are struggling to make ends meet. Another thing we can do is **act**, which is just what we did at a special church meeting after a Sunday service in late October. The church agreed to extend the opening hours of the coffee morning until 2pm, as a warm space and to offer soup or a simple lunch.

'Warm spaces' mean that people can go somewhere during the day where they can find warmth and possibly refreshments. We are offering

a space where people can come, find friendship and maybe an activity or two without charge. We have a sign that says refreshments are provided free of charge, though you may make a donation if you wish. We are hoping to receive a grant towards our costs from Torbay Council – the application has been submitted and we are wating to hear the result. At the moment it's Roy and I who are ensuring that the warm space is staffed from 12 noon. We need others to join us, and if you are able to help either regularly or now and again please speak to Roy. We have had some amazing conversations with people who have dropped in, including from one person who is hoping to move back to Torquay and has offered their services as a volunteer once they move back. Donations for the warm space are very welcome, either pop along and put it in the donation plate on a Friday or let myself or Roy have it and we'll do it for you.

I began with Advent and Christmas and I'll close with them. I'll be putting my **Advent book box** out again, so feel free to take a book to read over the Advent period as you prepare for Christmas.

Roy and I are opening our home for **Christmas Cheer at the Manse** on Saturday 10th December between 10 and 12 and 2 to 5, for anyone who would like to drop in for tea, coffee and festive nibbles. Our famous hot spiced apple juice will also be available. All church members and friends are invited, everyone is welcome, and if you need a lift let us know.

On the side table in church there are **Christmas activity posters** (similar to the one on the back page) with details of our Christmas services. Please take one if you can display one in your car or on a notice board if you live in a block of flats. We can get posters to you if you can't get to church, or can email a PDF if you have access to a colour printer. Posters are available as A4 or A5.

Hopefully Christmas this year will be a little more normal that the past two have been, and I hope that you will be able to share some of it with family and friends.

Wishing you love, joy and peace for Christmas and the coming year.

GOING BATTY AT THE MANSE?

Regular readers might remember that last year we had an interesting visit of a bat in my bedroom. So this August we took part in the Devon Bat Survey, the results of which help Devon Biodiversity Records Centre work out how bats are using the landscape within the 'Saving Devon's Treescapes' core areas.

There are 18 species of bat in Britain and they all have different needs, so some are more likely to be found in dark, rural areas such as the greater horseshoe bat, and others are happy in towns and cities, like the common pipistrelle. All the bats in the UK eat insects, so they are great natural pest controllers!

We were loaned a 'bat detector' to put in the garden for 3 nights. Bats find their prey through echolocation - where the bat calls at a very high frequency (which most humans cannot hear, although children are sometimes able to) and listens for the return call as it bounces off an object. This helps them to build up a map of their surroundings and find their prey. It is these calls that the bat detector recorded, and many of these calls are distinctive to a particular bat, or a group of bats, allowing the experts to work out what species were detected.

We were amazed by the numbers recorded (which relate to the number of bat passes rather than the number of individual bats):

Species	No. of passes
Common pipistrelle	632
Myotis species	20
Serotine	17
Soprano pipistrelle	4
Long-eared bat	1



Common pipistrelle

Common pipistrelles are the most common and widespread of all British bat species. They are found in lots of places, including towns and cities, as well as in the countryside. They are small, and their flight is fast and jerky as they pursue small insects which they catch and eat whilst flying. A single pipistrelle can consume up to 3,000 insects in one night!

The serotine is one of Britain's largest bat species and usually one of the first to appear in the evening. It has a leisurely flight style, with distinctive short glides, steep descents and circling over open areas. Serotines look for food over open habitats like pasture, parkland, woodland edge, tall hedgerow, over water bodies and will also hunt over streetlights in suburban areas.

GIFT AID AND OFFERINGS

Capital Gains Tax.

The ministry and mission of our church is almost entirely dependent financially on the generous giving of our members and friends. We do also gain significant income from users of our premises (thanks particularly to Ann Close who looks after hall lettings), but this all gets spent on the running and maintenance of the buildings.

These notes are intended to help you think about some ways in which you might be able to help the church's finances.

- 1 Please join our Freewill Offering envelope scheme which encourages you to put your offering in the weekly envelope even if you're unable to attend. Envelopes for 2023 will be available shortly.
- **2** Alternatively, consider paying your offering by Standing Order, for example monthly. Jenny can provide you with a simple form for your bank.
- 3 However you give, if you pay income tax, you can sign up for Gift Aid. If you need a form, or want to check whether you are already signed up, please contact me. (Note, if you have previously signed up for Gift Aid, but now no longer pay tax, you must let me know please.) Gift Aid doesn't cost you anything (and if you are a higher rate tax payer it benefits you), but it means the church gets an extra 25% from HMRC on everything that you give, so long as that amount is not more than what you pay in income tax and
- **4** If you're not a tax payer (or don't want to sign up for Gift Aid), we can still get help from HMRC so long as you pay in cash, as we get 25% back on 'small cash donations' (applies to each individual donation of no more than £30, and cash only, not cheques). This applies for example to money in the collection plate, cash in the envelopes from 'non-Gift Aid' people, and the donations jar.
- **5** Finally, you might consider including the church as a beneficiary in your will. You would make a real and lasting difference to the future of Furrough Cross URC.

Thank you for ongoing support during these tough times for everyone's finances, to ensure that we can continue to do Christ's work and be his witness in our local community.

A LETTER TO ALL MEMBERS AND ADHERENTS OF UNITED REFORMED CHURCHES Ian Hardie (URC National Treasurer) and

Dear Friends,

After 2 years of pandemic and lockdown, and Covid still with us (thankfully, for most, in a much weaker form), we can worship together in person and find fellowship again. But for most of us it is not simply a return to how it used to be; some people have not returned to church, some have died or become too frail, some churches have closed and others are considering it.

Now we have significant European turmoil and its effect on fuel and food prices for us in the UK.

Thank God that "Jesus Christ is the same yesterday and today and forever" (Hebrews 13.8). Whatever else changes, He is our rock, our cornerstone.

Financially, things were extremely tough for churches in 2021. Plate offerings had collapsed; some regular givers had to reduce or entirely stop giving to support God's work; and churches which hire out their premises had seen income from that source disappear. Even those churches where the majority of the giving was by standing order or bank transfer (if you have not considered regularising your giving in this way, please do – it helps your treasurer significantly) may have seen a 20% or greater drop in income.

If this had been replicated in giving to the Ministry & Mission (M&M) Fund in 2021, we might have been faced with a serious financial crisis last year.

But no, through the generosity of individuals, churches and Synods, we can report that income only fell by 4.4%. With a similar reduction in expenditure, the M&M Fund result was a deficit of only £80,000, a deficit that can be comfortably covered by reserves.

So, thank you to all who continued to contribute to your local church, thank you to all those churches who met their commitment for 2021 in full, and thank you to all those who, in adversity, continued to treat the M&M Fund as the first priority and paid what they could.

With churches and individuals under financial pressure, 2022 is not going to be an easy year either. The M&M Fund budgeted income (based on Synods' projections) will not be sufficient to cover expected costs and we are reconciled to dipping into our reserves more seriously as a result.

However, if we "ordinary Christians" are to fulfil the call of Jesus to be His witnesses in the world around us, we need ministers and other workers "on the ground" and we need shared resources which are often best created centrally. That all comes from the M&M Fund.

Again, thank you all!

PRIME MINISTER'S COUSIN AT FURROUGH CROSS – continued from October magazine

The Reverend John Eddowes Gladstone (JEG) continued to adopt a strongly Evangelical Protestant position throughout his long ministry, sternly resisting at every opportunity the influence of the Oxford Movement. He remained uncompromising, and eminently conservative in all his actions. He rejected ritualism and tradition within the church and 'it will be a surprise to no one to learn that there was no cross observable in his church, no floral decorations on the altar, and the services of an excellent choir and organist were little utilised'.

JEG himself provided written evidence that his own ministry in Wolverhampton was an energetic one. In a letter written in 1880 to the Bishop of Lichfield, he said '... we have five services, either in the Church or Rooms, every week ... the vicar and curate have divided these services between them ... we have a Scripture Reader partly supported by a Grant of the Church Pastoral Aid Society, partly by Messrs George and Henry Baker, and myself ... we have a most active, devoted and painstaking Bible woman, paid partly by subscriptions and to a very considerable extent, by myself ... we have 20 volunteer visitors and Tract distributors. Under my personal supervision and direction, we have two Mothers' meetings and Benefit Societies which meet twice a week for devotional exercises, Scripture and other profitable reading, for sewing, and paying in their money ... the aggregate number of these women whose husbands are of the labouring class is 200. I believe I am within the mark when I say there is no parish in this town or neighbour-hood which can compare with us in this respect. We have a Women's Burial Club consisting of about 200 members. We have good and flourishing Sunday Schools on both sides of the parish with a staff of 32 teachers. We have a Band of Hope with 120 juvenile members ...'

However JEG's relationship with the Bishop deteriorated badly and he accused the Bishop of setting in motion 'a fearful engine of episcopal injustice and tyranny'. He finally resigned his benefice at St. Matthew in 1889, at the age of 75 years, due to indifferent health. He lived in retirement with his family in Tettenhall until 1895. He spent the last six years of his life with Euphemia at Braunton, Devon, where he died in 1901 aged 87.
