

### FROM THE MINISTER

Dear Friends,

October and November are often seen as times of remembering. At the end of October there is All Hallows Eve, the day before All Saints' Day on the 1<sup>st</sup> November and All Souls' Day on the 2<sup>nd</sup> November. Both All Saints' and All Souls' celebrate the lives of those who have lived before us. Then of course there is Remembrance Day on the 11<sup>th</sup> November, when we remember those who gave their lives during



the First and Second world wars and the conflicts that have followed. December too has in recent years become a time of remembering, with Longest Night services and Blue Christmas services which remember family members and friends who will not be with us at Christmas.

If you have a social media account then I suspect like me there will be times when up pops a post to remind you of something that happened in the past. Recently a post came up on mine from four years ago: it said Day One of Three – it was for our move from Hayling to Babbacombe.

A lot has changed over the last four years. Covid radically changed everything, with most activities having to come to a complete stop during the pandemic. Some of the things that happened at church have never recovered, others have decided to end. Some things have restarted – albeit on a different day and have gone from strength to strength, and there have been new activities too.

Times of remembering should not just be a looking back with sadness at what has been lost. There are lots of things to give thanks for with our memories of times past. Things we enjoyed, things we learnt. I find myself being surprised when remembering, as I suddenly realise that a particular memory has enhanced an interest, an activity or a way of doing something today.

As I remembered the journey that had led to Roy and I being here at Furrough Cross, I was reminded of the one thing that has been constant throughout my life on this Christian journey, and that is prayer. One of those things was when the church I attended had an annual '24 hours of prayer', when the church was open for 24 hours with specific people responsible for one or more hours. There were prayer activities that you could come and take part in. The church had a youth group and the teenagers used to be in church overnight with some of the Junior Church leadership. They took it in turns to sleep and pray. One activity they did overnight was to pray through the church directory of members and friends, with their leaders reminding them who the different people were and their involvement with the church.

Perhaps prayer is one of those things which some Christians shy away from. This should not be the case. I see prayer as a conversation with a

really good friend. A place where joys, sorrows and concerns can be shared. The psalms are often called the prayer book of the Old Testament. Many of them are songs of lament, a crying out to God asking why something has happened. Of course there are also lots of psalms of praise too!



Prayer has to be at the top of our list. We must commit whatever we do to God in prayer, and that means listening to God as well as asking. I belong to a group that meets weekly over Zoom to pray for the UK. Once we've greeted each other and shared personal news we spend around five minutes in listening prayer. We silently ask God to place on our hearts what he wants us to pray for that week, and then we share what we feel God has said to us. Sometimes people mention things in the

news, someone might have a Bible passage, or a hymn or sacred song. Sometimes someone will bring a picture they have seen in their minds eye and of course there may be some who don't get anything at all and that's fine too. Often we find that some of the things we share after listening connect together, and this is where we begin our praying. By the time our meeting is over, more often than not we have prayed into all the items that were shared in listening prayer.

I would like to encourage each of us to pray not just on your own but to come together in groups, and that can be in person or online, to pray regularly for the church at Furrough Cross, the things that are happening week by week or now and again. In the early part of next year I want to organise some prayer activities and I would ask that you begin to pray about this; and if as you pray to and listen to God you feel that God gives you a message, a passage of scripture, a hymn or song, or a picture, please do share it with me.

May God bless you richly as you connect with Him.

### **TURKEY AND SYRIA EARTHQUAKES - SIX MONTHS ON**

As Turkey and Syria rebuild after the devastating earthquakes that struck 6 months ago, stories of



support from community organisations demonstrate the power of compassion and solidarity during times of crisis.

The two earthquakes that hit southern Turkey and northern Syria in February caused widespread devastation. At least 58,000 men, women and children have died. Homes, hospitals and schools have been destroyed. Lives are changed forever.

In the days that followed, Christian Aid local partners were on the ground in Syria supporting relief efforts. As six months have gone by, our partners have continued their work to support communities as they begin the long road to recovery.

The situation was particularly grim in northwest Syria. Only 5% of reported sites were reached by search and rescue operations in the first 72 hours after the earthquake. There was, and continues to be, a lack of heavy machinery to remove rubble.

Christian Aid has reached more than 60,000 people in NW Syria in the weeks and months that followed. Winter kits, emergency kits for children and cash for essentials have been distributed to vulnerable families. Another 5,000 people have been helped in Southern Turkey.

Christian Aid has been working with local partners in Syria for decades. But recent continued efforts are made possible by the generosity of our Christian Aid supporters. Over £3.4 million was donated – thank you!

### STOP PRESS

Following the devastating earthquake in Morocco and the flooding in Libya in September, we are now collecting for Christian Aid's appeal to provide relief. In Libya they are providing medical assistance, supplies and pharmaceuticals; emergency shelter; sanitation and hygiene kits, and food.

The plate will be out until Sunday 8<sup>th</sup> October for any donations you can make. To start it off we donated the proceeds from our Harvest Lunch.



We had a great return to Messy Church following our summer break. With the theme of God's Creation, the children (and adults too) enjoyed an afternoon full of

activities. One of the favourite crafts of course was making slime. You have never seen such a (glorious) mess! Some of the adults I noticed were not quite so enthusiastic, but hey what's a bit of slime on your new school uniform. Gulp! So there was no life on earth until God made things live - maybe there was just gloopy slime all over the place?

Other activities included making thank you cards to send to someone to remind them about the beauty of the world and the loving care of God; decorating earth balloons (thinking about the fragile nature of the earth



and how we should look after it); creating pipe cleaner bugs and balloon people and animals; and we also had a cocktail bar (strictly non-alcoholic!) A huge thank you to Beryl for standing in at the last minute to help the children decorate home-made biscuit animals - the eating crafts always go down well! made on each day of the week. And of course on the last day God rested.

During our worship time we heard about the different things God created, thought about what small things we can do to look after our world and prayed "Lord thank you for the gift of your world. Help us to live as one family and care for everything you have made. Amen." We also watched a video about The Creation and looked at some amazing things in our world, including a bridge in Vietnam held up by two hands, an upside-down house and a factory in the shape of a picnic basket.

And then, with a smile God said "Women and Men. Made in my image, made to be friends.

Made to make babies, sweet boys and girls.

Made to take care of my beautiful world."



### THE POUND IN YOUR POCKET

The current high rate of inflation affects us all, and of course it affects the church's expenses too. And it's not only the higher costs we are having to pay (especially for energy), but the offerings are not keeping up with inflation. For example, if you were donating £10 in 2008, that now only buys 58% of what it did then: one would need to donate £17 now to achieve the same effect. Over just the last 2 years the 'value' of £10 has reduced to £8.13, and an equivalent donation would be £12.30.

MARY JONES Roy Cadoux


Last time I went to Wales I visited Mary's home and the monument there. This time I stopped off at the Bible Society's 'Mary Jones World' on the shore of Lake Bala. It's not exactly Disney World, but the award-

winning visitor centre in a redeveloped historic church building tells the story of Mary Jones and Rev Thomas Charles (the minister in Bala who provided Mary with her Bible after her famous 26-mile walk, and whose grave is in the



churchyard) – and the impact of the world's best-selling book on Wales and beyond. It was Mary's walk that inspired the formation of the forerunner of the Bible Society, which more than 200 years later is working in over 200 countries, translating, producing and distributing Bibles, with a focus on China, Africa and the Middle East.

It was a very interesting visit, and there's a good cafe, picnic area and children's playground.
