

Dear Friends,

Seasons come around and in the manse front garden I've noticed that the snowdrops and daffodils are beginning to push their way through the earth. Signs of spring are on their way. And it's a sign that the Christian year is moving its way from Christmas to Lent and Easter.



This year Lent begins on 5th March, and I've been reflecting on Jesus' time in the wilderness. The word wilderness conjures up the idea of a very unhospitable place. In the Bible there are many instances of people in the wilderness. Perhaps the most well known is the 40 years that Moses and the people of Israel spent there in need of food and water, which God provided time after time when there was a need. It was to the wilderness that Eiljah ran after the battle with the priests of Baal, although God had triumphed. Elijah was afraid of what King Ahab or his wife Jezebel would do. It was to the wilderness Hagar fled with her son Ishmael, fearing for their lives because Sarah saw her and her son as a threat to her son Isaac.

Yet it was in the wilderness that Moses, Elijah and Hagar encountered God. There they each met with God. Moses received the Ten Commandments – the way of life for the people of God. Elijah was renewed and heard the still small voice of God. Hagar received a promise for her son and went back to her master and mistress.

There are times when each of us for a time find ourselves in the wilderness. Circumstances in our lives not quite are what we expected. Or perhaps there's that time in between one thing and another. It's a time to pause, to spend time reflecting on what has been and what might

We had a great Jesus-filled **Christmas Messy Church**, with the church echoing to the sound of laughter, stories, prayer and song. The air was wreathed with the smells of

cooking of sausage rolls, pigs in blankets and pizzas. We welcomed the children with Christmas puzzles and games, quickly followed by a video called "He chose the shepherds". God didn't choose the rich and important people to be the first ones to see His Son. It was the poor shepherds caring for their sheep on the frosty hillsides of Bethlehem who were told the glorious news by the angels.

We talked about how it would be if no one remembered when it was your birthday and how sad you would feel. And often this happens people forget that Jesus was born at Christmas and was sent by God to earth to show us the right way to live.

We did so many things to remind us of the Christmas story. The children drew pictures on stones of the nativity, which they could keep or hide somewhere for someone else to find. They made beautiful shell angels, chocolate mangers with a jelly-baby baby, helped create a big picture of the Christmas story, made decorations to hang on their Christmas trees and, the most popular of all the crafts, made edible donkey dung!

During worship time the Rev Val Price told us all about the grumpy innkeeper who had to keep answering the door to a succession of people who wanted to see the new Baby born in his stable. Eventually even the innkeeper was pleased to welcome the new baby into the world, little realising who He was. After this everyone sang "Away in a Manger" and then down through the church came Mary riding on a donkey, accompanied by Joseph, some angels, a shepherd, and some wise men. And in the manger was a real live baby (thank you baby Ophelia) which Mary was able to rock and show to everyone.

To end our worship time all the children were given a Christingle orange, where the candle was lit to symbolise Jesus as the light of the world. The church looked beautiful when the lights were turned off and just the Christingles sparkled in the darkness. Our afternoon ended with a delicious Christmas buffet - sandwiches, crisps, pizzas, salads, sausage rolls, cold chicken and jelly. What a feast it was organised by our marvellous catering team, led by Agnes. Thank you to all who donated food.

They iced biscuits with starry decorations, decorated boxes filled with the gift of a sweet, covered golden crowns with sticky gems, played a camel racing game, painted beautiful stars, decorated jars with wise men and lights, made star hanging mobiles and painted giant wise men for our kids display board. In our worship time Heather re-told the story of the kings finding Jesus in a stable and not in a palace, and heard about the gifts they gave to Him. We heard that Jesus is with us all the time and that although being a follower of Jesus doesn't mean that everything is easy, we can know that He is always there with us.

CHRISTMAS QUIZ: TRUE OR FALSE? ANSWERS

1 The Bible says that Jesus was born in December?

False: The Bible doesn't mention when Jesus was born. The best evidence points towards late September/ early October. The shepherds were still tending to their flocks in the fields, but practice was that they would only keep their flocks in the fields from April to October, taking them back home to shelter them over the winter months.

2 Jesus was not born in 0 AD?

True: Jesus could not have been born in the year 0 AD as it doesn't actually exist historically - our calendar jumps straight from 1 BC to 1 AD with no intervening year zero! The birth of Christ is generally accepted to be around 5 or 6 BC, as Herod died in 4 BC.

3 We are told that Mary rode into Bethlehem on a donkey?

False: Although perfectly possible that she rode on a donkey, the Bible says nothing about how Mary entered Bethlehem, only says that she came with Joseph.

4 Jesus was circumcised on the 8th day of his life?

True: Jesus was an Israelite (Jew) and therefore would have been circumcised according to the law of Moses on the 8th day. (Luke 2: 21)

5 Early Christians celebrated the birth of Jesus?

False: There is no mention of either the apostles or the early Christians celebrating the birth of Jesus. There is no trace of Christmas until it was first mentioned by the Roman Church in 336 AD.

6 The barn animals miraculously spoke the night Jesus was born?

False: The barn animals talking is an ancient myth that has absolutely no biblical grounding.

7 God is the real father of Jesus?

True: Joseph was the stepfather of Jesus, but God is his real father.

8 Jesus always celebrated his birthday?

False: The idea of celebrating birthdays is a pagan one and neither the Jews, the apostles nor Jesus would have celebrated them.

9 Micah foretold that Jesus would be born in Bethlehem?

True: The prophet Micah prophesised that Jesus would be born in Bethlehem, 500 years before the event. (Micah $5 \vee 2$)

10 Mary, mother of Jesus, did not remain a virgin for the rest of her life?

True: Mary went on to have other children with her husband Joseph. Church tradition shouldn't be a reason to ignore what the Bible tells us. (Mark 6:3, Matt 13: 55 - 56, Ps 69:8-9, Gal 1:19)

11 God told people to remember the birth of his son?

False: We are told to remember Jesus' death, not his birth (1 Cor 11: 23 - 26)

12 The angels told the shepherds that they should worship the baby Jesus?

False: The angels did not tell the shepherds to worship Jesus, the shepherds merely went to 'see' the baby Jesus and when the shepherds returned they were praising and worshipping God, not the baby Jesus. (Luke 2: 15, 20)

13 The angel said "Peace on earth to all men"?

False: The angel said "on earth peace, goodwill toward men". The word 'peace' from a biblical sense does not mean the absence of war or strife between people, but rather a 'peace with God', a peace that Jesus was to make with God at his sacrifice. Goodwill comes from the Hebrew ratzah, which is often associated with acceptable sacrifice, thus 'goodwill toward men' means reconciliation through the greatest of all Days of Atonement - Jesus' sacrifice. The alternative textual reading of: 'to men of goodwill', means the same thing: 'peace to men who know themselves reconciled to God through Jesus'. (Luke 2: 14)

14 The wise men were present at the birth site of Jesus?

False: Almost every depiction of the nativity scene shows well dressed wise men, surrounded by shepherds, presenting their gifts to Jesus while he was in the manger. The Bible truth is very different (Matt 2: 11). They met in a house and Jesus was a young child: it is possible that he was walking and talking by the time they reached him. Herod ordered the killing of all the children up to two years old for he knew that Jesus could have been nearly two years old by then. (Matt 2: 16)

15 We are told that the angels sang at the announcement of Jesus' birth? False: The carol "Hark the Herald Angels Sing" may suggest they did, but the Bible doesn't say anything specific about the angels singing. (Luke 2: 13)

16 The Bible tells us that three kings riding on camels visited Jesus?

False: The Bible does mention magi coming to visit Jesus, but does not say how many or that they were kings or riding camels. There were at least two as the word magi is plural, but there could have been many more. The Bible simply mentions three gifts. (Read Matt Ch 2)

17 Mary gave birth on the night that she arrived in Bethlehem?

False: The Bible would suggest otherwise (Luke 2: 6). Arriving in town well before her due date would make more sense.

18 The star led the wise men straight to Jesus?

False: The star led them first to King Herod, after which they saw the star again, leading them to Jesus, but they were two separate sightings of the star and not continuous (see Matt 2: 2, 9)

19 The tradition of giving presents at Christmas comes from the wise men presenting gifts?

False: In pre-Christian Rome, the emperors compelled their most despised citizens to bring offerings during the Saturnalia festival (in December) and Kalends (in January). Later, this ritual expanded to include gift-giving among the general populace. The Catholic Church gave this custom a Christian flavour by re-rooting it in the supposed gift-giving of Saint Nicholas.

20 25th December was originally the date of a Roman festival?

True: The original significance of 25^{th} Dec is that it was a well-known festival celebrating the annual return of the sun. 21^{st} Dec is the winter solstice (shortest day of the year and a key date on the calendar), but 25^{th} Dec was the first day that ancients could clearly note that the days were definitely getting longer and sunlight was returning. On this day the Romans worshipped the 'Unconquered Sun' or Sun god.

The date for Christmas was chosen by the Roman Catholic Church. Because Rome dominated most of the "Christian" world for centuries, the date became tradition throughout most of Christendom.

So, why was 25th Dec chosen? Since no one knows the day of his birth, the Roman Catholic Church felt free to choose this date. The Church wished to replace the pagan festival with a Christian holiday. The psychology was that is easier to take away an unholy (but traditional) festival from the population when you can replace it with a good one.
