FINAL EDITORIAL

As we near the end of our time here, I'm remembering back to when we first came to Furrough Cross in 2019, to meet with the elders to determine if Heather might be the right minister for the church. I was invited to join the meeting, and at one point someone asked me where I thought I might fit in. I mentioned the husband of a minister at our sending church (i.e. before Heather became a



minister) who had virtually no relationship with the church, and we were lucky if we saw him once a year on a Sunday. No assumptions can be made about the spouse of a minister. But I think I then said I'd be happy to help out in the life of the church where there was a need. It's been a joy and a privilege over the past almost six years to get involved in many areas of church life and learning new skills.

So much has happened at Furrough Cross since Heather was called and began her ministry here nearly six years ago. Within a few months we lost our dear friend Maggie Field, who was doing so much as Church Secretary. Then Covid struck, and the life of the church was thrown into turmoil. Heather had to take responsibility for ensuring that we were complying with the various regulations and guidance to stay safe – do you remember wearing masks, social distancing, different ways of serving communion, and the many Sundays when we could only meet online thanks to Zoom? Heather had to forgo the 3-month sabbatical that she was entitled to.

It was great when things started to get back closer to normal. Messy Church was able to restart, and we have been so blessed with our volunteers who get stuck in each month. Sadly though (like many churches) children have rarely been coming on Sundays. We have been able to continue to make our Sunday services, and Church Meetings, available online for those not able to get out, and I am grateful to Mariana who has greatly improved what we can offer. We have been without a musician for some time, but we have continued singing with gusto accompanied by the digital hymnal. Wednesday worship and Friday coffee mornings resumed and have both been very successful.

Things have changed in the life of the church, and will no doubt change more, but Jesus Christ remains the same yesterday, today and forever!



There's a BBC TV programme called 'Sort Your Life Out', in which Stacey Solomon and her team encourage and help a different family each episode to have a massive 'declutter' of their homes (everything gets laid out in a massive warehouse so they can realise just how much unnecessary stuff they've got). As Heather and I have been preparing for our move, the programme has been a helpful encouragement to us to think about what we really need, what would be better to give to someone else or to a charity shop, and what really belongs in the bin!

The programme also made me think about our lives – how much clutter have each of us got, that get in the way of us following Jesus? Do we have concerns that we really don't need to keep worrying about? Are there things we are doing that someone else could do much better? Is there rubbish in our lives that needs to be confined to the bin?

It's nearly time for some goodbyes, and I've already said mine at Torquay Community Larder....

It's been a privilege to see the generosity of people who donate food and money, and the gratitude expressed by most of the recipients of food parcels. It's been an eye-opener to listen to some of their stories and realise the extent of homelessness, poverty and addiction in our community.

FROM THE MINISTER Rev Heather Cadoux

Dear Friends,

Recently I spent several days at the Synod ministers' spring school. It was an opportunity to renew relationships with ministers that I'd met over the years, either in a different Synod or whilst training, as well as an opportunity to reflect and learn from our speakers.

One of the themes that came out of spring school was 'Bookmarks of Faith', and we were asked to reflect on which of the four bookmarks we were experiencing at that moment.



The four bookmarks are:

- Incarnation Christ coming into our world as a child and being Immanuel, Christ with us.
- Suffering Maundy Thursday and Good Friday.
- **Resurrection** The Joy of Easter and knowing our salvation.
- Pentecost Spiritual experience and going deep with God, be that Father, Son or Holy Spirit.

We follow these bookmarks through the church year, but where we are in our own walk of faith may not correspond to what is happening in the church year. I know that I'm very much aware that for some, Christmas is not a time of joy. Sometimes we rush from Palm Sunday to Easter Sunday and almost skip over the sadness and horror of Thursday night and Friday. It is our experiences when we are in those bookmark places that enable us to grow in Christ – be that from a joyful event or from the depths of sorrow, frustration, loss or illness.

I'm aware that when I have had times at the 'suffering' bookmark I have been supported by the prayers of my fellow Christians. Each experience has taught me more about my faith. I think the biggest lesson I've learnt is to trust God, especially for the things over which I have no control, and that has been very freeing. There is little point worrying over those

things you can't change, or that depend on someone else's input. Instead, I concentrate on what I can do.

For me, being a Christian is all about relationships: with God – Father, Son and Holy Spirit – and with those who God places in my path. I find it incredible how many of my conversations with people who say they are not religious end up being very spiritual.

Sadly, this is the final time I shall write the minister's letter to you. As with all changes, there are some things I will miss and others I'm more than glad to give up. For me my time at Furrough Cross has been both challenging and rewarding. The biggest challenge was of course Covid. I'd only been here a few months and hardly got to know you when lockdown came along and we had to find other ways of keeping in contact. There have been many joys as we have shared all sorts of experiences together, both spiritual and social activities, and I will miss the relationships that I have with you.

Roy and I will be praying for you as you go into the future and seek leadership for the church here at Furrough Cross. I'm sure you will find us back here at some point as visitors. I know some of you may well want to keep in touch with us, and elsewhere in the magazine you'll find our contact details for when we move. If you find yourself having to visit Derriford Hospital and have time for a cuppa do let us know, as we will be very close.



SAM'S STORY Sam Cadoux (grandson of Roy & Heather)

I'm doing a Coast to Coast cycle with my Dad to raise money for Children's Hospice South West (CHSW) on 24th - 25th May. We will get the train to Barnstable and then cycle 116km (72 miles) back to Plymouth.

CHSW have 3 hospices, and we go to Little Harbour because my



brother, Josh, has epilepsy and gets quite poorly. He was diagnosed when he was 6 weeks old and has still got it now. He is 7 but his mind acts like he is 3 or 4. When we go to Little Harbour I am supported by the Sibling's (Sibs) Team. They play football with me, play in the soft play with me, take me out on trips and play pool with me.

There is usually at least one other sibling so I have some company while the nurses and carers look after my brother. If I have any worries about anything the Sibs team are there to listen and help. All of the nurses and carers at Little Harbour help Josh to do his best, have fun and give me and my parents a break because he is quite hard work sometimes. My brother struggles with his feelings and behaviour which adds to the stress of his seizures at home as well as out and about. Little Harbour gives us time to be a family without needing to worry about him.

CHSW provide hospice care for children and young people with lifelimiting conditions and their whole family across the region. The care they offer is wide ranging, including hospice breaks, sibling support, palliative care and end of life care.



Easter Messy Church was certainly a lively one! Although lots of chocolate and eating was involved we were so glad the children heard the story of what Easter

really means. We started our afternoon hearing about Jesus riding into town on a donkey (yes we had a life-sized donkey for Freddy, our Jesus, to ride). All the children followed the donkey waving their palm leaves and shouting "hosanna". The next part of the story was hearing how Jesus was put to death and the children and adults stuck heart shaped post-its on a paper cross and thought about some of the wrong things we had all done.

We then followed on with our activities. The children could make mini



Easter gardens or help make a big one. There were Easter biscuits to ice, boulder rolling to do, a Holy Week wheel to colour in, a cross to decorate and a giant Easter picture to make. I think the most popular





activity was the zip-lining eggs. Everyone wanted to take part in that well who wouldn't?

Our worship time saw the children watching the two Marys visiting the tomb where Jesus had been laid and finding the stone rolled back and Jesus' body gone. Imagine their surprise when Jesus met them in the garden. God had brought him back to life. We all felt it was so important that the children heard the story of the REAL Easter.

Next everyone enjoyed a supper of fish fingers, beans, salad, cheese and crusty

garlic bread, followed by ice cream Vienetta. And if all that wasn't enough, the children concluded the afternoon with an Easter egg hunt. Woo hoo! Never have so many eggs been found in such a short space of time! So, laden with the crafts they'd made, the eggs they'd found and an Easter comic they'd been given, everyone made their weary way home.

(A lovely remark by one of our littlies: "Today I've had a 'rejection' in my arm with a needle" - bless her heart!)

"God's Wonderful World" was the theme of May's Messy Church, and what a wonderful world it is! We started with a video showing some of the marvels of the world - an amazing bridge being held up by two gigantic hands; the tallest tree in the world; the smallest animal; an upside-down house, and houses in the shape of a boot, a violin and a piano! Of course we had to sing "Who put the colours in the rainbow" - such a fab song to praise God for His marvellous creation: "Who put the hump upon the camel", "Who put the sparkle in the stars", "Who put the scent into the roses". Amazing lyrics.

The children had numerous activities to choose from: making a praise quilt (did you know that you could praise God for "Sven's Grill"? Well at Messy Church you can!); vegetable print animals on a canvas, biscuits covered in creepy crawlies (sweetie insects in case you were wondering!); magical sun catchers (made from recycled CDs); bird feeders (made by recycling bottles and cartons); painty beautiful butterflies, and pictures to illustrate God's marvellous handiwork in the night and day skies, animals, nature, the oceans, the planets, and His marvellous wonder of giving us families. There was a lot of laughing and shouting and painty hands. A lovely messy and happy afternoon.
