lt has been real а to encouragement receive positive feedback from number а guests recently, hopefully the case studies below give you a real sense of achievement as we make real а

difference in peoples' lives:

J is mum to 5 children and has a partner. She has been coming to us on and off for over a year, firstly referred by the Helpline. We had noticed, over the months that she was becoming more depressed and her partner also seemed the same. On a visit earlier this year her 17 year old son explained that the 2 youngest had been taken into care. We continued to offer food parcels and support as and when she came in. At the end of May, she and her partner came in to say thank you for the support we had provided. They both looked different people! They explained that major issue along with had been a mental health breakdowns. They were both clearly in control of their drinking and were getting support from mental health teams. She also explained that they were hoping to regain custody of their children later this year. emphasised that they would be welcome at the food bank and that if they were in future need they should pop in.

A is a young man who had fallen on hard times, finding it hard to make ends meet, as he was not working. Again, he has been using our food bank for some time and after a while opened up that his main issue had been debt. He explained that he had decided to take the option of paying back large amounts each month which was why he was in difficulties. About a year ago he announced he had got a

permanent job, we were delighted for him and told him to continue using our services until he was financially sound. Today (end of May), he came in and told us that he has just paid off the last part of his debt! We were delighted for him, but again explained that we would be there in future and not to slip back into debt.

T is a young lady who we have served on and off for years. When she first came to us she was homeless and obviously under the influence of something. Her appearance was always ragged, grubby and vacant. We have seen a change in this young lady over several months. She now has a small flat and is more in control of her life - she looks completely different. We still help her from time to time with food - occasionally providing her with a Tesco



Voucher so that she can top up her utilities or phone. She is always helpful and considerate whenever she visits now.

An incredible £5,122 was raised in a single day when Torbay charity Ladies Lounge held a fund-raiser at the home of David and Valerie Scott in Wellswood.

The registered charity supports vulnerable women who have been affected by domestic abuse/violence and as a consequence have mental problems and addictions. health Meetings are held in Upton Vale Baptist Church's Youth Basement everv



Monday and Wednesday where snacks and refreshments are available as well as professional support.

A craft table helps the women to relax and open up and share their experiences. There is also a separate area where they can simply relax and chat. All volunteers are trained and DBS checked.



Ladies Lounge totally depends on donations. The fund-raiser had an initial target of £1,000 but a team of ladies from several Torbay churches came together to make some beautiful crafts of their own which proved highly

popular. More than 100 jigsaws and 200 pristine condition novels were sold along with plants and other items. Complimentary tea/coffee and cake were available to everyone on a glorious day weather-wise.

Suzanne Wesley, on behalf of Ladies Lounge, said she was staggered by the amount raised and the generosity and support of people from many Bay churches who turned up on the day.

JUNE MESSY CHURCH



The Holy Spirit is a difficult enough

story for adults to understand let alone children. But this was our themes for June's Messy Church. On arrival the children enjoyed their usual chat and laughter playing games together. This was followed by a little video illustrating the story of the first



Pentecost - showing the disciples gathered together waiting for the



present Jesus said he would send to them after He went back to heaven to be with His Father. We saw the disciples waiting, when a sound like a rushing wind blew through the room and flames, which didn't burn, rested on all of their heads. God had sent His Holy Spirit and it made all of Jesus' friends feel brave and strong.

Our activities reflected our theme. Like the

Holy Spirit, we can't see the wind but we can see what it does, so the children made windmills, paper aeroplane prayers, stained glass kites, flame headbands, iced "all sorts" biscuits and painted pictures of trees blowing in the wind, kites, balloons and hot air balloons. They also helped with a picture of the



disciples receiving the Holy Spirit. Most popular craft of the afternoon was making popcorn - watch how it changed and jumped and popped.



During worship time we heard again how the Holy Spirit rested on Jesus' friends and how it changed them into brave followers of Jesus who wanted to tell everyone about Him. We saw how an hairdryer made ribbons move - without seeing how it happened and bubbles were blown out to float away without seeing the air which made them

move. All the children were given a handful of corn to put into the popcorn making machine and whoosh popcorn went everywhere followed by shrieking children trying to catch it! We talked to God and prayed for everyone we knew who wasn't well. Following this Doris

presented Roy and Heather, who are retiring shortly, with a beautiful rose for the garden in their new home.

Everyone enjoyed supper - jacket potatoes with tuna, beans and salad, followed by ice cream and sweeties. How do our kitchen team do it every time.

At worship time the children re-enacted the story, with Eddie playing Jesus and some of the other children playing his disciples. We saw them



sail out on to the lake. When the storm blew up everyone did the sound effects - the noise of the wind blowing, banging drums for the thunder and shaking the rain sticks for the rain. When Eddie, our Jesus, stood up and said "Be Still" everyone was instantly quiet. Amazing. Then we prayed together thinking of

things we might be afraid of and thinking of people in our Messy Church

families who weren't very well. God hears our prayers whether we say them out loud or in our hearts.

After worship time, there were hot dogs, burgers, cheese and salad to be enjoyed, followed by ice creams and ice lollies. Very welcome on such a super warm day, and expertly delivered by our catering team.





And, of course, finally, we had our traditional water fight. Oh my goodness, water pistols, cannons and water bombs. It was chaos. All the children were wet and Karen and Raymond soaked to the skin. What were we thinking. But amidst all the fun, we pray that one day our families will look back at the time they spent at Messy Church and
