Who would have thought that God would choose a young woman in an obscure village to carry the Saviour of the world? Someone with no status, no wealth, no voice in the corridors of power. A virgin.

Who would have thought that something as mundane and bureaucratic as a census would become an instrument in fulfilling God's promise? A decree from Caesar Augustus. Just another piece of administrative governance. Yet beneath the surface, heaven was moving. Prophecy was unfolding.

Who would have thought that the King of Kings would enter the world not with trumpets, but with the soft cry of a newborn baby, wrapped in cloth and lying in a manger? No palace welcomed Him. No royal guards stood watch. He came into this world surrounded not by glory and fame, but by humble straw and the quiet breath of animals.



The children (and adults too!) were fascinated as the puppet told us how we all had to behave. Then Tanya showed us a jar of marshmallows and all the children had to try and guess how many there were, write down their guess on a post-it and pop it in a basket.

Moving on to the activities, the children could choose from: planting a hyacinth bulb (with full instructions on how to care for it!); making a



scarecrow magnet, creating fruits from marzipan, colouring in and filling a fruit basket, creating a harvest picture and saying what they were thankful for, writing it on a leaf and sticking it on to a "thankful tree".

Our worship time was led by Tanya who asked the children to try and imagine 5,000 people sitting on the ground eating the bread and fish that Jesus had miraculously provided for them all. Five of the children read the

story from the Bible. Then the children were asked questions and if someone gave the right answer they were given some bread to eat or a fish for the bath tub! Such a blessed worship time, with the children interacting so beautifully with Tanya.

Supper was jacket potatoes with beans or tuna or cheese - seconds and thirds were devoured by the children. Equally ice cream wafers were loved judging by the chocolatey mouths all around us!

FROM POSTMEN TO CHRISTMAS CARDS: THE ROBIN'S JOURNEY



Robins feel inseparable from a British Christmas, their bright red chests glowing against winter grey. But their place in our festive imagery has a surprisingly practical origin.

In Victorian times, postmen wore red uniforms and were nicknamed “robins” or “redbreasts.” When Christmas cards became popular, designers played on the joke by drawing actual robins delivering letters—standing in for the cheerful postmen who brought Christmas greetings to people’s doors. The image caught on, and the robin quickly became a festive favourite.

Later, people added gentle Christian symbolism, imagining the robin warming the fire in the stable where Jesus lay, its chest singed red in the process. These legends came after the fact, but they deepened the robin’s association with hope and warmth.

Today, the robin endures as a small, bright reminder of joy, companionship, and messages of goodwill during the darkest days of winter.
